Internationally, India has the prospect of designing a parallel universal power balance yet internally it is shackled by disorder and petty conflicts. It is this single theme that runs through most of the works, speeches and interviews of Shashi Tharoor - the greatness of India's past, the promise of a bright future yet a cataclysmic present. The suspense of the situation is that the destiny of this volatile nation can turn either way at anytime for the good or the bad. The question is will India emerge as the utopia the world is looking forward for it to be or will it end up in the nightmare of dystopia of another massacre and massive annihilation. This question is at the very basis of the lifetime literary mission of Shashi Tharoor.

Embracing rather than accommodating, exchanging rather than comparing, assimilating rather than coexisting are the ways of the Indian psyche – the collective psyche of a one and a quarter billion people. The singularity of India is that it has always stood for peace and could be described as the very embodiment of peace in a war mongering war stricken world – an oasis in the desert of unending conflicts.

Added to this is the mounting tension at the borders shared with a hostile country that is absurdly provocative and unreasonably uncouth and hitching for a nuclear confrontation. Further exacerbating the situation is the fact that external mercenary groups working secretly underground to undermine the very integrity of the great nation. Add to this the uneducated and unqualified milieu of politicians and a hysteric media - that completes the picture of the ugly side of the modern India.

However, the actual image abroad of India and Indians is totally a different one in the present world. From the international perspective, India is a utopia of endless possibilities, the most promising land of future potentials and a unique nation that has the control to change the power balance of the planet. This enviable position was not achieved by the cast of a dice between time and fate but through centuries of character refinement through culture and civilization, the search for truth and philosophy of life and building a legacy of tolerance and amity.

"This country with all these qualities inherited from millennia of living as an example of this sort of culture has the soft power that would truly make it the influential leader in the 21st century," Tharoor said , but he also said "Because our civilizational ethos has been the immeasurable asset for our country and it is bipolar. We do not allow specter of religious intolerance and political opportunism to undermine our soft power in the 21st century." He put in the simplest words possible when he said: There were aspects of Indian society and culture that the world found more attractive than just government initiative. Today those aspects may not directly persuade them about India, but they go a long way to enhance India's standing in the world."

Whilst he is a staunch nationalist, incurable indophile, most informed and well-experienced expatriate and the best spokesperson India could have, Shashi Tharoor has expressed his sincere evaluation of India from a global perspective and he is of the conviction that India has the singular advantage of being a model country, mainly owing to its love for pluralism and refusal to straightjacket itself as an exclusive belonging of a particular group of people – whatever majority they could be and irrespective of whatever happened in the past to justify their claim.

"I believe in an India of pluralism and diversity, not of religious bigotry and caste politics. I believe in an India that is secure in itself and confident of its place in the world, an India that is a proud example of tolerance, freedom and hope for the downtrodden."

Openly speaking about the change of political atmosphere that is now more conducive to the evil destructive forces that would rather lay India shattered to pieces than tolerate the great nation with a population of one-fifth of the world stride the world stage, Shashi Tharoor says, "Our democracy, in the last 70 years, has been built on the idea that a nation may celebrate differences of caste, creed, conviction, color, culture, cuisine, costume and custom — and still rally around a democratic consensus". That pluralist consensus is on the simple principle that in a democracy you don't really need to agree — except on the ground rules of how you will disagree. One of those basic ground rules is respect for difference, not just respect but, as Swami Vivekananda so memorably put it, acceptance of difference. This rule ensures that our diversity is a source of India's strength, not a weakness. And the responsibility of the government is to uphold that idea of difference and to firmly, clearly reject any attempt to dilute it. He also makes his political standpoint clear when he says, "It is time for the government to take its own slogans seriously and put India first. India's great strength, and the source of much of its soft power and the respect in which it is held in the world, is our



precious legacy of civilizational pluralism, coupled with our robust democracy. The Indian adventure is that of human beings of different ethnicities and religions, languages and beliefs, working together under the same roof, dreaming the same dreams.

Shashi Tharoor is deeply disturbed by the fact day by day the evil forces are becoming stronger by joining hands to suck up the life source, strangulate the very breath and suffocate the supple spirit of India. Shashi Tharoor warns: We cannot simultaneously sell ourselves to the world as a land of pluralism, tolerance and Gandhianism, while promoting intolerance, communal hatred and minority insecurity within the country". He also states with an air of finality that "The fact that we are a land of such rich diversities and one that does not impose narrow conformities...The whole thing about being Indian is that you can be many things and be one thing, it is an important lesson in a world in which we are all trying to grapple how to manage diversity."

In conclusion, we can say that the vision of Shashi Tharoor for India is that India should quickly sort out its internal conflicts and move towards the bright future that is predestined exclusively for India. He advocates the simple democratic policy of one for all and all for one without the dividing walls of religion, ethnicity and language for India. The core feeling of oneness with the one great nation and the remarkable sense of being and belonging to a billion group mass of thousands of diversity yet all in a unison harmony is in itself a unique unifying feeling, the one feeling that all Indians share in common and that feeling is the one of the heritages we have to save for the future generations India.
